PULSEPOINT RESPOND

Empowers everyday citizens to provide life-saving assistance to victims of sudden cardiac arrest. App users are notified if someone nearby is having a cardiac emergency and may require CPR.

- If the cardiac emergency is in a public place, the location-aware application will also call for advanced medical care.
- Directs potential rescuers to the exact location of the closest Automated External Defibrillator (AED).

PULSEPOINT AED

Crowdsource AED location information.

- Report and update AED locations so that emergency responders, including nearby citizens trained in CPR, can find an AED close to them when a cardiac emergency occurs.
- Use it to report AEDs in your community. Describe the location, snap a picture, and the information is stored for local authorities to verify.

After that, the AED location data is made available to anyone using **PulsePoint Respond** and local dispatchers in the emergency communication center, allowing them to direct callers to the nearby life-saving devices.

- Safety (criminal activity, large fires, etc.)
